REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Revision of Rules and By-Laws

Upon a proposal by Miss Susan Scully, recording secretary, the committee on pension law and rules recommended that the rules of the board of trustees be amended to strike the following paragraph from Rule 1:

The committee on pension law and rules also recommended that in order to provide a sufficient number of members to expedite the work of the canvassing board, by-law 7, section 5 be amended to read as follows:

- In odd-numbered years two judges of election shall be thus chosen from each of the odd-numbered districts and one from the administrative offices of the Board of Education.
- 3. In even-numbered years two judges of election shall be thus chosen from each of the even-numbered districts, two from the group comprising the Chicago Teachers College and Chicago City Junior Colleges, two from the group comprising Commercial, Trade, Vocational and Continuation Schools and two from the group comprising Schools for Crippled Children and Social Adjustment Schools.

Then the committee presented a letter from the Chicago Teachers' Union suggesting that provision be made whereby playground teachers may be permitted to vote for pension trustees by mail.

Recognizing the fact that in certain instances, due to conditions beyond control, some contributors do not have access to a polling place, the committee recommended that the executive secretary be directed to draft an amendment to the by-laws to provide for voting by mail, and to present the same to this board at its next regular meeting.

Upon a motion by Mrs. Light, seconded by Miss Scully, the recommendations of the committee were approved and the amendments indicated above were thereby adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Amendments to By-Law 7

The committee on pension law and rules presented the following amendments to by-law 7, sections 2, 6 and 8, and recommended their adoption.

By-Law 7-Section I.

Add the following paragraph:

Any person desiring to vote by mail shall apply to the office of the Board of Trustees for such ballot. The application therefor may be by mail or in person, but must be received at the office not later than ten (10) days preceding the date of the election. The name of such applicant shall be stricken from the registration sheet for his polling place and shall be added to a list of persons desiring to vote by mail. The ballot must be returned by mail, and must be received at the office not later than the day immediately preceding the election. It must be enclosed in a sealed envelope marked "BALLOT", which sealed envelope together with a form bearing the voter's signature and the name and address of his regular polling place shall be enclosed in an envelope addressed to the office of the Board of Trustees, postage prepaid.

Section II.

Change the numbers of paragraphs 4, 5 and 6 to 5, 6 and 7, respectively. Insert the following as paragraph 4:

As soon as possible after the receipt of a proper application for a ballot to be cast by mail, such ballot shall be delivered or mailed to the applicant. On its return it shall be delivered to the Canvassing Board.

Section VIII, Paragraph 2.

Change paragraphs b, c and d to c, d and e, respectively. Insert paragraph b as follows:

b. Receive from the recording secretary all sealed envelopes containing the ballots cast by mail, the voters' statements of identification, and a list of all persons who previously had indicated a desire to vote by mail.

Upon a motion by Mrs. Johnsen, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks, the recommendation of the committee was approved by unanimous vote, and amendments to by-law 7, sections 2, 6 and 8 were declared adopted.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

The recording secretary, Miss Susan Scully, presented a report of the canvassing board by Arthur Petrie, chairman, and Laura Schaubel, secretary, as to the results of a referendum held on March 16, 1951 on proposed pension amendments. The statement of votes cast was as follows:

The report of the canvassing board certified the foregoing as a true and correct statement of all votes cast and that the majority of the contributors voting in the referendum approved the proposed amendments.

Upon a motion by Miss Scully, seconded by Miss Burns the report was approved and ordered printed in the proceedings of this meeting, and the ballots and referendum materials were ordered carefully preserved for six months after this date.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

Exchange of United States Government Bonds

The Committee on Finance reported that the United States Treasury Department had offered to exchange, par for par, United States government bonds issued on 6/1/45 and 11/15/45, maturing on 6/15/72/67, and bearing interest at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}\%$ for bonds issued on 4/1/51, maturing on 4/1/80/75, and bearing interest at the rate of $2\frac{3}{4}\%$.

The committee reported further that, after careful consideration of the terms offered and with utmost regard for the financial interests of this fund, it rcommended the exchange of the above described bonds owned by the fund in the principal sum of \$2,650,000.00 (par value) under the conditions stated above.

Upon a motion by Miss Burns, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks the above described exchange was approved and the executive secretary was ordered to proceed with all negotiations therefor by the following roll-call vote:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Legislation

The committee on pension law and rules presented the following summary of proposed pension amendments, approved by a majority of the contributors voting in a referendum on March 16, 1951, and recommended that bills incorporating these changes be prepared and presented to the 67th General Assembly of the State of Illinois.

The committee further recommended that the recording secretary be instructed to notify the teachers of the above action and to keep them informed as to its progress through the legislature, and also that the General Superintendent of Schools be requested to grant leaves of absence to representatives of the Board of Trustees in order to further the passage of these bills.

Proposed Amendments

I. Increased Benefits

A. Retirement Pension

Proposal. The rate shall be \$880.00 for 20 years of service, with an increase of \$100.00 for each year above 20 years, up to a maximum of \$2,880.00 per year after 40 years of service and payable at a minimum age of 55 years. This proposal contemplates the assumption by the fund of the \$500.00 emeritus payment which is spread throughout the benefit schedule for all teachers retiring after the enactment of this amendment, according to the following schedule:

Teachers retiring at age 65 under the compulsory retirement act will be guaranteed, as a minimum payment, a pension of not less than the pension plus emeritus salary which would have been paid under the old law.

B. Disability Pension.

Proposal. The rate shall be \$480.00 per year for 10 years of service, increased \$40.00 for each year of service above 10 years, up to a maximum of \$880.00 per year for 20 years of service. If service is 20 years or more, the retirement pension shall be payable without regard to the age of the teacher. (See schedule above)

II. Increased Revenue

A. Contribution by Teachers

Proposal. Rates shall be increased to provide approximately one-third of the additional amounts necessary to finance increased benefits, according to the following schedule:

1st three years of service at \$165.00 annually 2nd three years of service at \$200.00 annually 3rd three years of service at \$235.00 annually Service thereafter \$270.00 annually

Since it is intended that the increased benefits will become operative immediately, instead of being deferred for a period of years (as is the practice in other funds), and also in order to partially compensate for inadequate contributions in former years, the rates of contributions in force on July 7, 1931 shall be applicable to all service previous to that date. Additional payments for such service will be required, but any contributions after 40 years of service shall be applied as an offset for this deficiency.

B. Revenue from Taxes (City of Chicago)

Proposal. The Chicago tax levy shall be increased from \$4,500,000.00 to not less than \$7,100,000.00 annually.

C. Revenue from the State Distributive Fund.

Proposal. The proposed pension schedule shown under item 1-A gives effect to the assumption on the part of the pension fund of emeritus salary payments to teachers who will retire subsequent to the effective date of the change. The emeritus salary payments to present pensioners would be continued by the Board of Education until the total obligation has been met for living annuitants and all such payments have terminated. To help finance this adjustment, it is proposed that the excess of Chicago's allocation of monies from the State Distributive Fund (set aside for the operation of the Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois), over and above the amounts expended each year for emeritus salary payments, shall be paid to the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund.

III. Administrative, Corrective and Clarifying Changes.

- A. Proposal. All substitute, evening school and temporary service and a maximum of 10 years on special leaves of absence granted by the Board of Education to teachers serving recognized Chicago teachers' organizations shall be credited for pension purposes upon payment thereof.
- B. Proposal. Maximum applicable contribution rates according to the law in force shall be charged for substitute, evening school and temporary service, outside time, sick and sabbatical leaves of absence prior to September 1948, special leaves of absence for service in teachers' organizations, and military service for which the Board of Education has not made payment.
 - C. Proposal. Deductions from pension payments shall be authorized in order to establish and maintain membership in non-profit group health and hospitalization plans according to group rates.

- D. Proposal. The Board of Trustees shall cancel a disability pension upon evidence that the pensioner is no longer incapacitated for teaching, if he has not attained the age of sixty. In the case of persons holding a valid certificate to teach in the Chicago Public Schools, an examination shall be made at least once a year by a physician or physicians appointed by the Board of Trustees. In the case of persons who are no longer certified to teach in the Chicago Public Schools, the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to engage investigating services whenever necessary in order to establish continuing disability and to determine whether or not such person is employed elsewhere as a teacher.
- E. Proposal. The investment authority of the fund shall be clearly defined to the extent that the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to invest the fund in United States Government securities, general obligation bonds of the State of Illinois or any political subdivision thereof, and general obligation bonds of any other State in the United States or political subdivision thereof, restricted in the manner prescribed by the Illinois Public Employees' Pension Laws Commission.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Report on Legislation

The committee on pension law and rules reported that, in accordance with the authorization of this board on March 17, 1951, a bill incorporating changes in rates of benefits, financing, and administrative procedures was introduced in the 67th General Assembly of the State of Illinois on March 28, 1951 and approved on June 1, 1951.

The committee reported further the approval on June 5, 1951 and enactment on July 1, 1951 of an amendment authorizing the crediting of service as playground instructors in those public playgrounds which were transferred from the City of Chicago to the Board of Education.

Upon a motion by Mrs. Light, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks, the report of the committee was approved and ordered printed in the proceedings of this meeting.

Legal Opinion Regarding Application of 1951 Law

The committee on pension law and rules reported that it had considered an opinion from the attorney for the fund, Mr. Henry W. Olschner, regarding amounts due the fund for creditable service, and recommended approval thereof.

The attorney's communication holds that the pension law, as amended on June 1, 1951, is applicable to all unpaid deficiencies. In cases of amounts due for service in the public schools of the United States and military service where payments on account have already been made, approval action by the board of trustees was necessary. The approval established the credits, services and amounts due therefor. The persons concerned in such cases accepted the approval action of the board of trustees by making payments on account of their respective indebtednesses.

Upon a motion by Mrs. Light, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks, the recommendation of the committee was approved and the executive secretary was instructed to proceed in accordance therewith.

Disposition of Election Material

The committee on pension law and rules reported that ballots and material used in the 1950 election of trustees were carefully preserved for more than six months, that they were no longer of use for any future election, and that they were not required as evidence for proceedings in any court and recommended that they be destroyed.

Upon a motion by Mr. Meierdierks, seconded by Miss Scully, the four-month statement of the Financial Secretary and the letter to Mr. Traynor regarding the 1952 tax levy for the fund were approved and ordered printed in the proceedings of this meeting.

Change in Fiscal Year

The financial secretary reported that the auditors for the fund, Arndt, Mann & Sweeney, certified public accountants, have recommended that, in order to expedite a control of contributors accounts, the books of the fund be kept according to a fiscal year coinciding with the school year beginning on September first and ending on August thirty-first.

The secretary reported further that Mr. A. A. Weinberg, actuary for the fund, likewise has approved such a change in the interest of uniformity in the presentation of financial statements and statistical compilations, including data reflecting operating experience, statistical analyses and other important facts pertinent to the administration of the fund.

Upon a motion by Mr. Meierdierks, seconded by Miss Burns, the recommendations of the auditors and actuary were approved, and a fiscal year beginning September first and ending August thirty-first were adopted as of September 1, 1951, and a financial statement covering the period from January 1, 1951 through August 31, 1951 was ordered prepared and published.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

Contingent Account

Receipted bills, cancelled checks, bank statements, and other supporting documents covering expenditures for the period from June 15, 1951 to September 14, 1951 inclusive, and totalling \$794.64, were audited.

Cancellation of Annuities

The Committee on Annuities and Credentials reported that pensions were granted on June 17, 1949 to Rosaline S. Mayer and Julia B. Corcoran, lunchroom managers, and that in each case the pension was suspended on September 5, 1949 in accordance with the provision of the law prohibiting the simultaneous payment of pensions and salaries to persons employed by municipal corporations.

The committee further reported that instead of pensions, appropriate refunds should have been granted to these two persons because of their continued employment in this capacity as employees of the Board of Education who are not participants in our fund, and that deductions from salary were paid by the Board of Education in error to our fund during such employment as lunchroom managers. These incorrect payments to our fund in each case altered the pension status and eligibility to pensions as of June 17, 1949. To correct this error applications for refunds instead of pensions have been made now by Mrs. Mayer and Mrs. Corcoran.

The committee therefore recommended that since pensions were granted to Rosaline S. Mayer and Julia B. Corcoran in error, that they be cancelled as of June 17, 1949 and that refunds of the excess of amounts contributed to the fund over the sums paid in pensions be authorized and paid; provided however, that each of said persons shall have executed and delivered to the fund her receipt therefor and a release that she has no further interest in or claim against the fund.

Upon a motion by Mrs. Johnsen, seconded by Miss Burns, the recommendation of the committee was approved. The cancellation of annuities and refunds of the excess of amounts contributed to the fund over the sum paid in pensions were ordered by the following roll-call vote:

In accordance therewith, it was recommended that cognizance be taken of this action by the Board of Education and that as of January 1, 1952 a measure of twenty days (20) for a month of service be established in the determination of validated and creditable service for fractional parts of a month, and also in the calculation of contributions due the fund in lieu of the present method of determining these fractional periods on a quarter-month basis.

The committee reported further that the Board of Education records the services of teachers in its Americanization classes on an hourly basis. In conformity with this procedure, it was recommended that four hours be considered as a basis for establishing one day's pension credit, provided however, that no more than forty hours (40) be considered during any two-week payroll period.

Upon the motion of Mrs. Johnsen, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks, the recommendations of the committee regarding the validation of fractional periods of service were accepted and approved.

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MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

The board unanimously approved a motion by Miss Burns, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks, to the effect that the permanent employees of the Chicago Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund be granted the same vacation privileges as are provided by the rules of the Board of Education for its Civil Service employees.

ADJOURNMENT

On motion of Mr. Meierdierks, seconded by Mrs. Johnsen, the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the Secretary.

REPORT OF FINANCIAL SECRETARY

Certification of Assets Held by the City Treasurer as of December 31, 1951

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Resolutions for Presentation to the National Council On Teacher Retirement

RESOLUTION NO. 1-STRENGTHENING OF EXISTING SYSTEMS.

WHEREAS, The Federal Social Security program has significant and far reaching implications for public employees now covered by retirement systems, due not only to its provisions for vesting, survivors' benefits, protection for the itinerant worker and meeting conditions created for retirants by the inflationary trends in our economy, but also because of the underlying trend toward the extension of Social Security coverage to public employees, as evidenced by the repeal of several State retirement laws and subsequent extension of Social Security coverage with or without supplementary local retirement benefits; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That the National Council on Teacher Retirement adopt a constructive and aggressive program directed toward the strengthening of each teacher retirement system to the end that the present and prospective benefits will not in any way be diminished, curtailed or impaired; that each system be urged to take all necessary steps to correct any deficiencies or weaknesses with respect to financing, the rates of benefits, and the scope of its benefit schedule; and finally, that the Council undertake a study in collaboration with other public employee groups and with the cooperation of the Research Department of the National Education Association, as to the advisability of incorporating Social Security in the retirement programs of the various public systems.

RESOLUTION NO. 2-CLARIFICATION OF VESTED RIGHTS.

BE IT RESOLVED, That in the case of state and local retirement systems not now protected by legal contractual rights with respect to their pensions, the National Council on Teacher Retirement recommend that each retirement system make every effort to secure the adoption of constitutional safeguards or such other appropriate legislation as may be necessary to establish a contractual relationship under which the benefits and accrued rights and expectancies of its members may not be diminished or impaired.

RESOLUTION NO. 3-VESTING AND CONTINUITY OF PENSION CREDIT.

BE IT RESOLVED, That the National Council on Teacher Retirement recommend that each retirement system provide in its retirement plans that teachers with five or more years of service credit may be assured of deferred retirement benefits should they continue in teaching service until they reach retirement status under membership in another teachers' retirement system; and further, that provision be made for teachers not covered by deferred benefits to purchase service credits in the system where they are now members.

RESOLUTION NO. 4-TAX EXEMPTION.

BE IT RESOLVED, That teacher retirement allowances be granted the same income tax exemption under the Federal Revenue laws, as is provided for beneficiaries of Social Security and the Railroad Retirement System.

Upon a motion by Miss Burns, seconded by Mr. Megel, the above resolutions were unanimously approved for presentation to the National Council on Teacher Retirement at its annual meeting on February 25 and 26, 1952 in St. Louis, Missouri.

Legal Vesting of Illinois Pension Rights

Upon a motion by Mr. Megel, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks, the board approved the following letter and authorized that it be sent to the public employee retirement funds in the State of Illinois and, in the case of all pension funds for policemen and firemen outside of Chicago, to their respective employee organizations:

The Board of Trustees of the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago is deeply concerned over the fact that rights to pension benefits and accrued expectancies are not legally guaranteed to public employees in the State of Illinois. In many instances the courts have held that, in cases where membership is compulsory, participants have no contractual rights. There is no binding obligation, therefore, to protect pensions after they have been granted or to insure deposits of the members.

Public officials in the State of Illinois, including members of the Legislature, have demonstrated repeatedly their interest in pension matters and also an appreciation of the value and obligations attendant upon the operation of retirement systems for public employees. During each session of the Legislature, laws are enacted which improve and strengthen our respective funds. It is felt that members of the General Assembly will be interested and concerned in this matter if it is called to their attention.

Accordingly, we are writing to inquire if your system will join with us in initiating a program aiming for an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Illinois providing for the creation of vested and contractual rights. We realize the difficulties involved in securing such an amendment to the Constitution and the length of time that such an action might take, but the results, in our opinion, will justify the efforts.

If your Board is agreeable to the proposal, it is suggested that a meeting of representatives of the various public employee pension funds be held with a view to giving full consideration to this important problem and to formulate the procedures for attainment of the specific objective. We shall appreciate hearing from you at your earliest possible convenience.

Ratification of Contract for Executive Secretary

Miss Burns presented the employment contract with Evelyn Sholund, the executive secretary, executed on February 14, 1952 for and on behalf of the Board of Trustees by its president and recording secretary, pursuant to the resolution adopted on January 18, 1952. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Legislation

The committee on pension law and rules presented the following summary of proposed pension amendments, approved by a majority of the teachers voting in a referendum on March 6, 1953, and recommended that bills incorporating these changes be prepared for presentation to the 68th General Assembly of the State of Illinois. The committee also recommended that these bills include administrative and clarifying changes which will not affect service credits, qualifying conditions or rates of benefits, but which will be designed to improve and simplify wordings of the present law.

- Legal vesting to establish a contractual relationship under which benefits and accrued rights and expectancies are guaranteed by law.
- Reciprocity to establish continuity of pension credit for public ememployees of Chicago and other Illinois public employee retirement systems.
- 3. Credit for services as a Chicago librarian, school clerk, or Chicago playground instructor; provided such service was rendered prior to the effective date of reciprocal agreements described above.
- Credit for special G. I. study leaves of absence and special leaves of absence to teachers in positions abolished by the Board of Education during 1933/34.
- Credit for each day of contributing service in computing rates of pensions.
- 6. Annual pension payments prorated over a period of twelve months rather than on the present ten-month basis.
- 7. Continuation of the present retirement pension increment of \$100.00 per year beyond 40 years up to a maximum of 45 years of service.

The committee recommended further that the recording secretary be instructed to notify the teachers of this action and to keep them informed regarding the progress of this legislation, and also that the General Superintendent of Schools be requested to grant leaves of absence to representatives of the Board of Trustees in order to further the passage of the bills.

Upon a motion by Miss Taggart, seconded by Mrs. Light, the report of the committee was accepted and its recommendations approved by the following roll-call vote:

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

Legislation by Board of Education

The recording secretary, Miss Burns, presented a communication from Mr. Frank R. Schneberger, Attorney for the Board of Education, which advised the trustees of the Board of Education's authorization and direction on April 22, 1953 to introduce a bill providing for the employment of compulsorily retired teachers on an annual basis and on a temporary certificate. An examination of a draft of the bill indicated that any teacher compulsorily retired by the Board of Education subsequent to July 1, 1949 will be eligible to such certification if he passes a health examination, and also that no such retired teacher shall be so employed after the end of the semester during which he attains the age of seventy years.

Upon a motion by Miss Burns, seconded by Mrs. Johnsen, Mr. Schneberger's letter was accepted and ordered filed with the documents for this meeting.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Pension Legislation

In consideration of the Board of Education's authorization for the introduction of a bill to provide for the employment of compulsorily retired teachers on an annual and on a temporary basis, Miss Taggart, chairman of the committee on pension law and rules, recommended that the trustees introduce a companion bill to provide (1) for the cancellation of any pension granted previously, (2) for pension contributions during the time of this employment, and (3) for the inclusion of this temporary teaching service in the computation of the rate of service retirement pension, payable upon final termination of employment.

In accordance therewith and on motion by Miss Taggart, seconded by Mrs. Johnsen, the board of trustees authorized the preparation of such a bill for presentation to the General Assembly, by the following roll-call vote:

Examination by State Insurance Department

The financial secretary, Mr. George O. Meierdierks, submitted a report of an examination of the conditions and affairs of the Fund by the Department of Insurance of the State of Illinois. This report is dated July 2, 1953 and covers a period from January 1, 1948 to and including August 31, 1952. It shows total assets of \$24,137,136.86 and total liabilitites of \$127,756,961.10. Mr. Meierdierks quoted the following from the report:

"The findings of the examiners, based upon the financial statement and supporting information contained in this report of examination, are summarized as follows:

The statement of assets and liabilities as of August 31, 1952, prepared from the books and records of the Retirement System, reflects an actuarial reserve deficiency in the amount of \$103,619,824.24, which is to be liquidated by future contributions of the participating teachers and through future taxation.

The cash position of the Fund, together with current income, is maintained at a level consistent with current pension payment requirements.

The investment holdings of the Fund, as of the date of examination, were comprised entirely of securities permitted under Article 34, Section 94, of the School Code.

Pensions and benefits have been granted in compliance with the governing Act, and they were properly approved by the Board of Trustees.

In conclusion, the review made of administrative policies and procedures followed by the Board of Trustees indicates that full consideration is being given to the statutory provisions governing the operation of the Fund."

Refunds and Death Benefits

The committee reported that documents pertaining to claims for refunds and death benefits for persons listed herewith were examined and verified. Applications for refunds a/c resignation were made by persons who are no longer employed as teachers by the Board of Education, and the amounts specified were in accordance with the law in force at the time each member became separated from service. In the cases of June F. Currin and Isabelle D. Treglown, applications for refunds were in lieu of applications for retirement pension and were accompanied by written releases to the effect that, upon receipt of such refunds, they shall have no further interest in or claim against the Fund. Claims for refunds to estates and for death benefits were determined after certifying dates of death and establishing proper evidence for each beneficiary, administrator or executor. The committee recommended therefore, that refunds and death benefits be granted for persons listed herewith in the amounts specified.

The committee also reported that applications for refunds of contributions were made by Evelyn P. Murphy, Rebecca Rosenblum and Ivy O. Barnett. Also, a request was made by Jeanette Kowitt for reconsideration of her claim for refund of contributions, considered and denied on January 16, 1953. In each case, the law in force at the time active teaching service terminated provided for 80% refund of contributions to the Fund upon application within 5 years from the date of separation. None of the above applications were filed within the required five year period. Therefore, on opinion by our attorney, Henry W. Olschner, the committee recommended that refunds to Evelyn P. Murphy, Rebecca Rosenblum, Ivy O. Barnett and Jeanette Kowitt, be denied.

In addition, it was reported in certain cases, that because required payments for deficiencies in contributions for service prior to 1931 were made before the dates of final retirement, additional offsets for service in excess of 40 years are now applicable. Therefore, the committee recommended that refunds be granted to persons hereinafter listed, for contributions after 40 years of service up to the full amount applicable as an offset to the 1931 deficiency.

The committee reported further that certain refunds to contributors were paid at the time a report on the audit of such contributors' accounts were submitted. In each case, the refunds were due to changes in rates of contribution for creditable service or to other required adjustments in the application of automatic increases in rates of contribution by the Board of Education. It was recommended that the payment of these refunds be confirmed and approved.

Pensions

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Report on Legislation

The chairman of the committee on pension law and rules, Miss Helen E. Taggart, presented the following report, describing the outcome of pension legislation presented to the 68th General Assembly of the State of Illinois:

- H.B. 549 (identical to S.B. 486) was approved on July 16, 1953. A summary of its provisions is as follows:
 - a. Continuation of the present retirement pension increment of \$100.00 per year beyond 40 years up to a maximum of 45 years of service.
 - b. Authorization for the crediting of Special G.I. Leaves of Absence and Special Leaves of Absence to teachers in positions abolished by the Board of Education during 1933/34.
 - c. Proration of annual pension payments over a period of twelve months rather than on the present ten month basis.
 - d. Consideration of fractional years, down to a single day of service (but not exceeding 45 years) in computing rates of pensions.

Because the Governor expressed a preference that further study should be made of techniques to achieve continuity of pension credit for public employees who transfer from one retirement system to another, he vetoed bills providing specifically for reciprocity. This temporarily made ineffective a provision in H.B. 549 to establish credit for services as a Chicago librarian, a school clerk, or as a Chicago playground instructor.

- 2. S.B. 395 (identical to H.B. 740) approved on July 1, 1953, provides for pension contributions by temporarily re-employed emeritus teachers and also for increased retirement pensions upon their final retirement. This bill is a companion measure to S.B. 394, sponsored by the Board of Education, to permit the temporary certification and re-employment (until the age of 70) of teachers compulsorily retired after July 1, 1949.
- 3. H.B. 528, approved on July 17, 1953, creates survivors' benefits for all teachers, both male and female. These include the following provisions:
 - a. Single-sum benefit upon death of teachers in service.
 - b. \$500 single-sum benefit upon death of future teacher-pensioners.
 - c. The option by any teacher to elect a reversionary pension for a designated survivor.
 - d. Widow's pension payable on death of male teachers and future pensioners.

The following additional revenues are provided:

- a. Pension contributions of male and female teachers have been increased \$6.00 and \$7.00 per year: (\$7.00 per year during the 1st three years and 3rd three years of service; \$6.00 per year during the 2nd three years of service and after 9 years).
- b. Contributions of male teachers have been increased further by an additional \$76.00 per year for the purpose of financing widows' pensions.

- c. Beginning in 1954 the tax levy has been raised from \$7,100,000 per year to \$7,500,000 per year.
- 4. S.B. 269 (identical to H.B. 604), providing for accrued and legally vested pension rights, was vetoed on June 1, 1953.

Pension Status of Emeritus Teachers

Olschner, emeritus teachers (re-employed by the Board of Education on an annual basis on a temporary certificate) are eligible to death and survivors' benefits provided by law and also that such persons are required to make all additional contributions required of other contributors under the law as amended in 1953 and now in force.

On motion of Miss Taggart, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks, this interpretation was unanimously confirmed and approved.

Disposition of Referendum Material

The committee on pension law and rules reported that materials used for the referendum, held on March 6, 1953, were carefully preserved for six months, that they were no longer of use for any future reference and are not required as evidence for proceedings in any court and recommended that they be destroyed.

Upon a motion by Miss Taggart, seconded by Mr. Meierdierks, the above described referendum materials were ordered destroyed and the report of this committee was approved and ordered printed in the proceedings for this meeting.

Refunds and Death Benefits

The committee reported that documents pertaining to claims for refunds and death benefits for persons listed herewith were examined and verified. Applications for refunds a/c resignation were made by persons who are no longer employed as teachers by the Board of Education, and the amounts specified were in accordance with the law in force at the time each member became separated from service. In the case of Gertrude G. Smith, application for refund was in lieu of an application for retirement pension and was accompanied by a written release to the effect that, upon receipt of such refund, she shall have no further interest in or claim against the Fund. Claims for refunds to estates and for death benefits were determined after certifying dates of death and establishing proper evidence for each beneficiary, administrator or executor. The committee recommended, therefore, that refunds and death benefits be granted for persons listed herewith in the amounts specified.

The committee also reported that application for refund of contributions was made by Mary Lee K. Talbot. Also, a request was made by Ivy O. Barnett for reconsideration of her claim for refund of contributions, considered and denied on September 18, 1953. In each case, the law in force at the time active teaching service terminated provided for 80% refund of contributions to the Fund upon application within 5 years from the date of separation. The above applications were not filed within the required five year period. Therefore, on opinion by our attorney, Henry W. Olschner, the committee recommended that these refunds be denied.

The committee reported further that refunds to contributors, listed herein, were paid at the time a report on the audit of such contributors' accounts were submitted. In each case, the refunds were due to changes in rates of contribution for creditable service or to other required adjustments in the application of automatic increases in rates of contribution by the Board of Education. It was recommended that the payment of these refunds be confirmed and approved.

REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

Resignation and Election of Trustee

This motion was approved unanimously and Mrs. Light was declared duly elected vice-president of the Board of Trustees.

Retirement of Attorney For the Board of Trustees

The recording secretary presented a letter from Mr. Henry W. Olschner, attorney for the Board of Trustees, in which he stated that, on advice of his physician, it is necessary to tender his resignation effective May 31, 1954, the end of his yearly employment. Pending the appointment of a successor, Mr. Olschner also offered his assistance to the Board of Trustees for as long after his retirement as may be necessary.

It was moved by Mr. Meierdierks, seconded by Mrs. Light, that Mr. Olschner's resignation, as of May 31, 1954, be accepted with sincere regret; that appreciation for his services to the Fund throughout the years be expressed and also that the trustees' best wishes for his future health and welfare be extended to him. This motion was approved unanimously.

On motion of Miss Taggart, seconded by Mrs. Light, it was ordered that Mr. Henry W. Olschner be employed at a monthly rate of \$300 until such time as his successor is able to assume responsibility and also that Miss Sholund be empowered to retain an attorney for special services in connection with pending claims for refunds of contributions and pertaining to requests for review of contributors' status, as related to certain deficiency payments.

Communication Regarding Participant's Status

For the record, the recording secretary advised the Board that Miss Minnie C. Mahacek, through letter of her attorney, Donald P. Vail, dated October 29, 1953 to Henry W. Olschner, attorney for the Board of Trustees, requested a ruling of the Board of Trustees as to her pension status. The Board of Trustees rendered its decision in this matter on November 20, 1953 and notified Miss Mahacek and her attorney thereof by letters dated and mailed to them November 30, 1953.

The Board of Trustees operates under and is governed by the Administrative Review Act, and, as more than thirty-five days have elapsed, the decision was rendered, Miss Mahacek was duly notified thereof and the matter is closed.

On motion of Miss Burns, seconded by Miss Taggart, this report was approved and ordered printed in the proceedings of this meeting.

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Revision of By-laws

The committee on pension law and rules presented the following revisions of Sections 1 and 2 of By-law 1, Section 1 of By-law 3, Sections 1 and 2 of By-law 4 and Sections 1, 2 and 3 of By-law 5 with the recommendation that they be adopted in lieu of the present By-laws of the same numbers and also that Section 4 of By-law 5 be deleted. The committee reports that these revisions are designed to clarify and expedite the procedure and business of the Board of Trustees; to eliminate sections which are now a part of the statute; and to implement recent amendments to the pension law.

- BY-LAW 1, Section 1. Proceedings of all meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be printed and made available to contributors and to other interested persons and organizations. Such proceedings shall contain an account of all business transacted and reports submitted. Upon approval by the Board of Trustees such records shall be regarded as official.
 - Section 2. An annual report shall be made as of the close of every fiscal year. The report shall contain a financial statement, verified by a certified public accountant, and other data pertinent to the operation of the Fund. Such report shall be printed and made available to contributors and to other interested persons and organizations.
- BY-LAW 3, Section 1. Each newly assigned teacher shall be advised of his status as a contributor to the Fund.
- BY-LAW 4, Section 1. The legal school year for any public school system of the several states or of schools operated by and under the auspices of the United States shall be accepted as the basis for establishing pension credit therefor. Fractional parts of a year shall be credited in such proportion as the amount bears to ten months.
 - Section 2. In conformity with the action of the Board of Education in this behalf, 180 days shall constitute a school year in establishing pension credit for substitute service, or employment in the Chicago Public Schools under a temporary teacher's certificate, or as a teacher in evening schools; provided that two evenings shall constitute one day's credit for such service.
- BY-LAW 5, Section 1. Validated pension time represents service that may be counted for pension fund benefits, provided the required contributions therefor have been made to the Fund by the teacher. In the allowance of any benefit, such as the lump sum payment on death in service, only validated service may be taken into account. Teachers returning to service under the provisions of Section 34-106 and who, on subsequent retirement, were subject to but did not acquire the necessary three years contributing service, (1) are not entitled to pensions at rates other than those in force at the date of their previous retirements plus additional credit for current service (not to exceed the legal maximum in force at the time of their previous retirements) and money contributed after their re-employment; (2) are not subject to the payment of any deficiency established by law after the previous dates of retirement, and (3) are not entitled to count service which was not creditable pension time under the law in force at the time of their previous retirements.

Section 2. A teacher, retiring at the end of any school month which falls on a date prior to the last day of the corresponding calendar month, shall be entitled to a pension in the same amount and at the same pension rate as though his retirement date was on the last day of the calendar month corresponding with said school month. In the case of a teacher retiring prior to the last day of any school month, his first pension payment shall be prorated according to the corresponding calendar month, provided (1) that if the school month and the calendar month are the same, the teacher will be entitled to a pension payment for the period beginning on the effective date of retirement and (2) that if the school month and the calendar month are not the same, the teacher will be entitled to a pension payment for the calendar month which corresponds to the school month beginning on the day of the month which reflects the exact number of days the teacher was employed in the corresponding school month. Teachers who retire, terminate employment, or resign and who return to teaching service as contributors to the Fund within five school months after the dates of such termination of employment, exclusive of any vacation periods, are only temporarily out of service during this period and are not permanently retired teachers entitled to all pension benefits. Such persons shall be entitled to receive pension payments for the time they could have been actively employed as teachers and received salaries, but they are not entitled to receive pensions for or during the vacation months of July and August prior to their return to service.

Section 3. Contributors to the Fund may make installment payments for their indebtedness to the Fund, provided that, in the case of non-interest bearing items which exceed a total of \$100.00, payments must be made for the full amount or in installments of not less than \$50.00.

On motion of Miss Taggart, seconded by Mrs. Johnsen, the recommendation of the committee was approved unanimously. Thereupon, the above revisions of Sections 1 and 2 of By-law 1, Section 1 of By-law 3, Sections 1 and 2 of By-law 4 and Sections 1, 2 and 3 of By-law 5 were adopted in lieu of the present By-laws of the same numbers and Section 4 of By-law 5 was deleted.

Revision of Outside Time Credit

The committee reported that on June 22, 1931, the public school teaching service of Helen W. Chapin was certified by the Kankakee County Superintendent of Schools as dating from September 1926 to June 1930. This service was approved by the trustees of this Fund on June 22, 1931. On May 25, 1954, Kankakee County Superintendent of Schools, Ruel Hall, certified by affidavit that the dates of Miss Chapin's teaching service were from January 1926 to January 1930. Records of the Chicago Board of Education show further that Miss Chapin was employed as a substitute teacher in the Chicago Public Schools from January 1930 through June 1930. Since the records of the Board of Education support the affidavit which was filed on May 25, 1954, the committee recommended that Miss Chapin's pension records be corrected to show 3 years and 9 months' outside time, dating from January 1926 to January 1930, instead of 4 years' outside time dating from September 1926 to June 1930, and also that \$2.50 (paid on September 6, 1934 for the additional month of outside time) be refunded to Miss Chapin. The committee recommended further that six months' substitute service, from January through June 1930, be considered as creditable pension time.

On motion by Mrs. Johnsen, seconded by Miss Taggart, the recommendation of the committee was approved unanimously and the above-described revision of outside time credit was duly authorized.

Credit for Educational Service in the Chicago Public Schools

The committee reported that the records of the Board of Education, supplemented by signed statements from present and past officials of the Chicago Board of Education, show (1) that Vernon L. Bowyer was employed as a "Budget Investigator—Educational" from March 24, 1925 through September 11, 1926; (2) that prior to this assignment he was a regularly assigned teacher at Lindblom High School and (3) that at the conclusion of this employment he was elected principal of the Skinner School. The duties of the "Budget Director—Educational", as described officially, were "to study the needs of the Education Department and to assist in preparing the educational part of the budget". Records of the Board of Education show further that the Board of Education had deducted contributions for the Teachers' Pension Fund in recent years from salaries of persons employed in a similar capacity.

With due consideration of the facts set forth above, the committee deemed this service to be creditable pension time and recommended that it may be validated on receipt of the required teacher contributions.

Refunds and Death Benefits

The committee reported that documents pertaining to claims for refunds and death benefits for persons listed herewith were examined and verified. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ANNUITIES AND CREDENTIALS

Pensions

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

The committee on pension law and rules reports that, in response to a request by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the trustees secured from the Fund's attorneys an interpretation of the pension law as it relates to the membership status of substitute, temporary, evening school and Americanization teachers. The point in question was whether or not these teachers are participants of the Fund and if they may contribute currently for services rendered. The Department of Health, Education and Welfare indicated that its reason for the inquiry was to determine if the above-mentioned teachers are entitled to Social Security coverage. According to the Federal Act, persons are not eligible for Social Security, if they are employed in positions which are included in a public employee retirement system.

The Fund's attorneys advised that substitute, evening school, temporary and Americanization teachers are excluded from participation in the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund. Their statement is as follows:

"The General Assembly has excluded substitute, evening school and temporary (including "adult education" and Americanization) teachers from participation in the teacher's pension and retirement fund unless and until they are assigned, by the board of education, to positions leading to tenure, and then they may receive credit for the prior service only upon making the prescribed payments.

The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Pension and Retirement Fund has no choice, therefore, but to comply with the provisions of the governing statute."

In response to our attorneys' opinion, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare ruled that substitute teachers and temporary appointees, employed in positions which are covered by the Chicago Teachers' Pension Fund, are excluded from Social Security coverage. In the case of Americanization and evening school teachers, the Department concluded (1) that, their positions are not covered currently by this Fund and (2) that they are entitled to Social Security benefits. Excerpts from its communication are as follows:

"... day teaching positions in the elementary schools, high schools, and colleges are positions covered by a retirement system within the meaning of section 218(d) of the Social Security Act and, therefore, old-age and survivors insurance coverage of service in such positions may not be elected (section 218(d) of the Social Security Act) for any teacher (whether he be serving therein as a substitute, temporary, probationary, or permanent teacher), whether or not the individual is concurrently receiving for such service credit in the Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund toward retirement."

"... teaching positions in evening schools, adult education classes, or Americanization classes are not positions covered by a retirement system within the meaning of Section 218(d)(1) of the Social Security Act. Service in such positions, therefore, may be included under the Federal program ..."

Refunds and Death Benefits

The committee reported that documents pertaining to claims for refunds and death benefits for persons listed herewith were examined and verified. Applications for refunds a/c resignation were made by persons who are no longer employed as teachers by the Board of Education. Applications for refunds of contributions for widows' pensions were made by persons who were not entitled to such benefits at the time of their respective retirements. Claims for refunds of contributions and for benefits payable on death of teachers and pensioners were determined after certifying dates of death and establishing proper evidence for each beneficiary, administrator or executor. The committee recommended, therefore, that refunds and death benefits be granted for persons listed herewith in the amounts specified.

It was reported further that on October 15, 1954, an application for refund of contributions was filed by Matilda G. Benziger. The records of the Board of Education show that Mrs. Benziger's name was placed on the Unassigned List on April 28, 1926 and that she was not employed as a teacher in the Chicago Public Schools thereafter. On August 7, 1927, an application for her re-appointment as a teacher was filed, but was withdrawn as of September 24, 1927. In a letter to the Board of Education dated May 21, 1953, Mrs. Benziger acknowledged a record of service which showed that her name was placed on the Unassigned List on April 28, 1926. In the opinion of our attorneys, Kirkland, Fleming, Green, Martin and Ellis, the Statute of Limitations bars the payment of this refund. In accordance therewith, the Committee recommended that this payment be denied.

In addition, the committee reported that other refunds to contributors, listed herein, were paid at the time a report on the audit of such conributors' accounts were submitted. In each case, the refunds were due to changes in rates of contribution for creditable service or to other required adjustments in the application of automatic increases in rates of contribution by the Board of Education. It was recommended that the payment of these refunds be confirmed and approved.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ANNUITIES AND CREDENTIALS

Pensions

The committee reported that applications for pensions were presented for persons hereinafter listed, with the recommendation that the pensions be approved and granted in the amounts and under the conditions set forth herewith. In the case of each applicant for service or disability retirement pension, the employment of the teacher had terminated officially and the legally prescribed minimum years of teaching service were completed. The applicant for a reduced retirement pension made due and proper election to receive such reduced retirement pension in order to pay a reversionary pension to a survivor after her death as a teacher-pensioner. One applicant for disability pension, Laura M. Burns, was declared by three competent physicians to be suffering from a disability which wholly and presumably permanently incapacitates the applicant for teaching. The second application for disability pension was made by Mrs. Winnifred M. Henry, Public Guardian and Conservator for Melba P. Davis. In the opinion of the trustees' attorneys, which was based upon medical evidence and court records, Mrs. Davis is entitled to a disability pension dating from October 20, 1951. They advised that the three-year limitation for filing application and the examinations by three competent physicians do not apply because (1) application could not have been filed prior to this date and (2) conclusive evidence of disability was established as of the date of Mrs. Davis' termination of employment.

Revision of Outside Time Credit and Military Service Credit

The committee on anuities and credentials recommended that, for persons listed herewith, approved service credits in the public schools outside Chicago and in the military service of the United States be revised. In the cases of the outside time, the records of the Board of Education show that the service was rendered concurrently with teaching service in the Chicago Public Schools. For the military service, the official records of the United States Army do not reflect the service credits approved previously. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Pension Legislation

The committee on pension law and rules recommended that the following substantive revisions in the pension law, which were approved by the contributors in a referendum on January 14, 1955, be incorporated in a Bill for presentation to the 69th General Assembly:

SERVICE RETIREMENT PENSION

The formula shall be $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ of average salary for each year of service (or fraction thereof) plus \$150.00, based on the five highest consecutive years of validated service within the last ten years of such service, after a minimum of 20 years of service and not to exceed a maximum of 45 years, and also payable at the full rate at age 60 or over. For retirements below age 60 down to a minimum age of 55 years, the pension will be discounted at the rate of 3% per year. The maximum salary measure shall be the rate paid by the Board of Education for Lane One, provided this maximum does not exceed \$6,000 per year.

DISABILITY RETIREMENT PENSION

The formula shall be 1¼% of average salary for each year of service (or fraction thereof), based on the five highest consecutive years of validated service within the last ten years of such service. Disability pensions will be payable after a minimum of ten years of service. After 20 years of service, the service retirement pension will be paid without regard to the age of the teacher, and on the basis of 55 years. The maximum salary measure shall be the rate paid by the Board of Education for Lane One, provided this maximum does not exceed \$6,000 per year.

MEMBERSHIP FOR TEMPORARY TEACHERS

Clarify the present statute to include temporarily certificated teachers as contributing members of the Fund; provided that their employment is not on an hourly basis.

REVENUES

Teacher contributions shall be 6% of salary with the provision that their deposits will be limited to the Board of Education salary schedule for Lane One and in no event shall the maximum salary measure exceed \$6,000 per year.

The annual tax levy for the Fund shall be increased from \$7,500,000 to \$9,000,000.

The committee recommended also that the Bill include corrective and clarifying changes necessary (1) to give effect to the revisions described above, (2) to simplify the wording and structure of the existing statute, (3) to eliminate duplicate sections in the law, (4) to authorize payment of the single-sum benefit on death of teachers in service to a designated beneficiary or to the teacher's estate, and (5) to define the Fund's investment authority in accordance with the recommendations of the Illinois Public Employee Pension Laws Commission and of the Board of Trustees' investment counsellor, Standard & Poor's Corporation.

Revision of Outside Time Credits

The committee reported that, at the request of Mr. James F. Groark, evidence of his service from September 1939 through June 1940 was reviewed. An examination of his records indicates that on April 19, 1940 the Board of Trustees approved two months' outside time in the public schools of Hazel Crest, Illinois. This service was rendered from September to November 6, 1939. An affidavit certifies that this period represented one-third of the school year. The school calendar shows it to be nine school weeks. Therefore, the committee recommended that Mr. Groark's outside time credits be revised to show nine weeks' service from September to November 6, 1939 rather than two months of service.

In addition, the committee reported that three years and six months' outside time (September 1927 to February 1931) was approved by the trustees on April 17, 1931 for Beatrice S. Helgeson. Refunds and Death Benefits

The committee reported that documents pertaining to claims for refunds and death benefits for persons listed herewith were examined and verified. Applications for refunds a/c resignation were made by persons who are no longer employed as teachers by the Board of Education. In the case of Margaret C. Byerwalter, application for refund was in lieu of an application for retirement pension and was accompanied by a written release to the effect that, upon receipt of such refund, she shall have no further interest in or claim against the Fund. Authorization for Accounting Control of Members' Accumulated Contributions and Service Credits

The committee on finance reported that, to give effect to accepted accounting standards, the auditors for the Fund recommended that a system of controls be established for the purpose of verifying and keeping in constant balance members' deductions from salaries and service credits. After careful study of the efficiency to be achieved by various manual and mechanical systems and their relative costs, the committee accepted the plan embodied in a proposal by Hayes Statistical Service, Incorporated. REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PENSION LAW AND RULES

Report on Pension Legislation

The committee on pension law and rules presented the following report on pension legislation, which was approved by the 69th General Assembly of the State of Illinois.

HOUSE BILL 510—ENACTED ON JULY 13, 1955 (The Chicago Teachers' Pension Bill)

Service Retirement Pension. The formula is 1½% of the average rate of salary times the number of years of service (or fraction thereof) plus \$150.00. The salary measure is based on the highest salary rate during five consecutive years of validated service within the last ten years, provided that this maximum salary measure shall be the rate paid by the Board of Education to teachers credited with bachelor's degrees, and provided further, that this maximum shall not exceed \$6,000 per year. Pensions are payable after a minimum of 20 years of service and are increased thereafter up to a maximum of 45 years. They are payable in the full amount at age 60 or over. For retirements below age 60, down to a minimum age of 55 years, pensions are discounted at the rate of ¼ of one per cent for each month.

Disability Retirement Pension. The formula is 1½% of the average rate of salary times the number of years of service (or fraction thereof). The salary measure is based on the highest salary rate during five consecutive years of validated service within the last ten years, provided that this maximum salary measure shall be the rate paid by the Board of Education to teachers credited with bachelor's degrees, and provided further, that this maximum shall not exceed \$6,000 per year. Pensions are payable after a minimum of ten years of service. After 20 years and before age 55, the service retirement pension is payable without regard to the age of the teacher and on the basis of 55 years.

Membership for Temporarily Employed Teachers. Teachers, who are employed temporarily by the Board of Education, are included as contributing members of the Fund, provided (1) that their employment is not on an hourly basis, and (2) that they are not temporarily employed for more than 40 days in a school year, during which time they are receiving pension payments from the Fund.

Revenues. Contributions for female teachers are fixed at 6% of salary and for male teachers at 7½% of salary with the provision that such deposits will be limited to the Board of Education salary schedule for teachers credited with bachelor's degrees. In no event shall the maximum salary measure exceed \$6,000 per year.

The annual tax levy for the Fund is fixed at \$9,000,000 for 1956 and each year thereafter.

Corrective and Clarifying Provisions. The following is a summary:

- a. Revision in the investment authority to permit the purchase of corporate bonds under certain restrictive conditions.
- b. Revision in the regulations for the single-sum benefit on death of teachers in service to permit payment to a designated beneficiary or to the teacher's estate.
- c. Elimination of duplicate sections in the law.
- d. Simplification in wording and structure of the law.
- e. Miscellaneous revisions, which give effect to the various changes, described above.

SENATE BILL 440—ENACTED ON JULY 11, 1955 (The Retirement Systems Reciprocal Act)

This is an Act to establish continuity and preservation of pension credit for employees in governmental service in the State of Illinois. It applies only to the following retirement systems, which have accepted the provisions of this Act:

City of Chicago Funds

Municipal Court and Law Department Employees' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago.

Park Employees' and Retirement Board Employees' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago.

Municipal Employees', Officers' and Officials' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago.

Sanitary District Employees' and Trustees' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago.

Laborers' and Retirement Board Employees' Annuity and Benefit Fund of Chicago.

Public School Teachers' Pension and Retirement Fund of Chicago.

State-Financed Funds

Judges' Retirement System of Illinois. University Retirement System of Illinois. Teachers' Retirement System of the State of Illinois. State Employees' Retirement System of Illinois.

Other Governmental Unit

Illinois Municipal Retirement Fund.

The essential provisions of this reciprocal system are as follows:

- For public employees who transfer from one Illinois reciprocal pension system to another after two years or more of covered employment, combined service credits will be used for determining eligibility to service retirement pensions, disability retirement pensions, or widows' pensions.
- 2. Proportionate pensions may be granted by each system according to its own formula, provided that
 - a. Employment in all reciprocal systems has been terminated.
 - b. With respect to the entire length of service, the longest minimum qualifying period, prescribed by any of the retirement systems involved in the combined credits, has been fulfilled.
 - c. The minimum qualifying condition, with respect to age, has been fulfilled.
- 3. No transfer of funds between the various reciprocal systems will be required.

On motion by Miss Taggart, seconded by Mrs. Johnsen, the report of the committee was accepted and its recommendations approved by the following roll-call vote:

Revision of By-laws

The committee on pension law and rules submitted revisions in the By-laws of the Board of Trustees designed to eliminate provisions which are now part of the statute and also to give effect to the recently enacted amendments to the pension law. The recommended changes are set forth below.

- 1. Add to by-law 2, the following:
 - "Section 2. In addition to the statutory limitations applicable to the purchase of corporate securities for the Fund, the Board of Trustees shall require that all such securities bear a rating of "A" or better by at least two nationally known security rating concerns."
- 2. In lieu of the present by-law 3, section 1, adopt the following: "Section 1. Each newly assigned or appointed teacher shall be advised of his status as a contributor to the Fund."
- 3. In lieu of the present by-law 4, section 2, adopt the following: "Section 2. In conformity with the Rules of the Board of Education in this behalf, and for the purpose of computing service prior to September 1955 in the Chicago Public Schools as a substitute, evening school or temporary teacher, 180 days shall constitute a school year; provided that, for evening school service, two evenings shall constitute one day's credit."
- 4. In lieu of sections 1 and 2 of by-law 5, adopt the following: "Section 1. In the case of a member of the teaching force who was employed temporarily by the Board of Education and who was a contributor to the Fund, the day of resignation or retirement shall be deemed to be the same as the expiration date of the member's certificate to teach in the Chicago Public Schools." "Section 2. Teachers returning to service under the provisions of Section 34-106 and who, on subsequent retirement, were subject to but did not acquire the necessary three years contributing service, (1) are not entitled to pensions at rates other than those in force at the date of their previous retirements plus additional credit for current service (not to exceed the legal maximum in force at the time of their previous retirements) and money contributed after their re-employment; (2) are not subject to the payment of any deficiency established by law after the previous dates of retirement, and (3) are not entitled to count service which was not creditable pension time under the law in force at the time of their previous retirement."
