Mr. Mark moved as an amendment that a Committee of Five be appointed to study the question and take it up with the teaching force of the City with instructions to investigate and suggest what changes can be made to the Pension Law so that the same may be put on a sound basis.

The amendment was accepted and the Chair appointed Messrs. Andrews, Mark, Rogers, Miss Goggin and Miss Root, as such Committee.

Mr. Christopher moved to reconsider the vote by which Mrs. Elizabeth Frank was placed on the Pension list at the last meeting.

The Chair held that no notice of a reconsideration had been given, and the motion could not be entertained.

The Secretary of the Pension Fund stated that the Fund was overdrawn \$141.00 and that it would be necessary to sell one of the water fund securities in the sum of \$1,000 to meet the payment of annuities for the month of January, 1900.

APPROVAL OF RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS.

On motion of Mr. Gallagher the reading of the record of the previous meeting was dispensed with and the record thereof, as printed, was approved.

ADOPTION OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Mr. Sexton, Chairman of the Special Committee appointed to draft rules and regulations for the Teachers' and School Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund, presented the following rules and regulations for consideration:

RULE 1. The officers of the Pension Board shall be a President, a Vice-President and a Secretary, who shall hold their respective offices for one year and until their successors shall be elected and qualified. These officers shall be elected at the second regular meeting in the month of July of each year, or as soon thereafter as may be practicable; the election shall be by ballot, and a majority vote of the entire Board will be necessary to elect. The person elected Secretary need not be a member of the Board, but must be a member or an employe of the Board of Education of the City of Chicago. None of the above mentioned officers shall receive any remuneration or compensation.

RULE 2. The meetings of the Board shall be held in the Board room of the Board of Education of the City of Chicago, at such time as shall be designated in the notice. In all cases where the regular meetings would fall upon a holiday, then such regular meeting shall be held on the

evening preceding such holiday, unless otherwise specially ordered.

RULE 3. The President of the Board, or any five members, may at any time call a special meeting of this Board, and all actions taken by this Board at a special meeting shall have the same force and effect as if the same were done at a regular meeting. Timely notice in writing shall be sent by the Secretary to all members of this Board of all meetings. Such notices may be sent by mail to the usual postoffice address of each member.

RULE 4. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board at which he shall be present, and he shall perform such other duties as usually pertain to his office, or as may be enjoined upon him by the Board. He shall be, ex-officio, a member of each General Standing Committee.

RULE 5. The Vice-President shall preside at meetings of the Board at which he is present and from which the President shall be absent, and he shall perform such other duties as may be enjoined upon him by the Board. In case of the absence or disability of the President, or of a vacancy in the office of the President, all the powers and duties of that office shall temporarily devolve upon the Vice President, who shall continue to exercise such powers and duties until they shall be resumed by the President, or until the vacancy shall be filled by the election of a President.

RULE 6. The Secretary shall have a general supervision of the books of record ordered kept by the Board, shall sign the records, and shall perform such other duties as usually pertain to the office of Secretary, or as may be enjoined upon him by the Board.

RULE 7. The Standing Committees of the Board shall be appointed by the President, as soon as practicable after his election, and there shall be six Standing Committees, as follows:

Committee on Judiciary	5 members
Committee on Funds	5 members
Committee on Claims	5 members
Committee on Annuities	5 members
Committee on Amendments	5 members
Committee on Pension Law	5 members
Committee on Rules	5 members

All Committees shall enter upon their duties immediately on their appointment.

RULE 8. The Committee on Judiciary shall exercise a general supervision over such affairs of the Board as involve legal questions, shall advise the Board, from time to time, concerning the Board's legal duties, obligations and relations.

RULE 9. The Committee on Funds shall exercise a general supervision over the finances and the property belonging to the Pension Board, and shall attend to the making of reports, from time to time, of the condition of the funds of this Board, and shall attend to the investing of the funds of this Board in such manner as this Board by a majority vote of all its members shall direct, and shall do and perform all things necessary to be done to save and keep the property of this Board in a strong financial and solvent condition.

RULE 10. The Committee on Claims shall hear, determine and pass upon all claims against this Board or against the property of the Board by any person, and report to the Board its findings and conclusions and recommendations.

RULE 11. The Committee on Annuities shall hear, determine and carefully consider all claims for annuities, either on the application of any person or when any person may be retired by the Board of Education of the City of Chicago, and as to the right of such person to an annuity, and report its action to this Board. Said Committee

shall have power to consider and report reductions, from time to time, in the amount of all annuities.

RULE 12. The Committee on Amendments to the Pension Law shall at all times keep a careful watch on the operation of the law under which this Board exists, to note its weakness and defects, if any, and wherein such law should be amended, altered or changed, and to make full and complete records, if any be found, and suggesting any amendments, alterations or changes, if any be deemed necessary, and in such record the various reasons therefor shall be duly set forth, and report the same, from time to time, to the Board, and especially within a reasonable time before the meeting of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois.

RULE 13. The Committee on Rules shall consider the rules and regulations of this Board, and shall, from time to time, report to this Board such rules or amendments to these rules as it may deem necessary for the government of this Board or to carry out and execute the spirit and intent of the pension law.

RULE 14. Any Committee of the Board may, as it shall deem advisable, consider any matters coming within the general scope of its duties, and advise the Board concerning such matters, without waiting to have them brought to its attention through reference from the Board.

RULE 15. At each meeting of the Board the President shall take the chair at the time appointed for the meeting, and call the meeting to order, and if a quorum be present, the order of business shall be as follows:

- I. Roll call.
- II. Reading and consideration of minutes.
- III. Petitions.
- IV. Communications.
- V. Orders and resolutions.
- VI. Unfinished business.
- VII. Reports of General Standing Committees in the following order:
 1. Committee on Judiciary.
 2. Committee on Funds.
 3. Committee on Claims.
 4. Committee on Annuities.
 5. Committee on Amendments to the Pension Law.
 6. Committee on Rules.
- VIII. Reports of Special Committees.
- IX. Miscellaneous business.
- X. Adjournment.

RULE 16. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a less number may adjourn a meeting to a subsequent date.

RULE 17. The rules of the Board, or any of them at any meeting, may be altered or amended, or their operation may be suspended for the time being by a majority vote of all the members of the Board; provided, however, that such alterations, amendments or suspension shall not conflict with any provision of the constitution or laws of the State.

RULE 18. The ayes and nays shall be taken and entered of record on all questions on the paying out of money or the loaning of pension fund property, and on any other question at the request of any member, if such request be made

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before the result of the vote shall be announced. All questions on the paying out of money or the loaning of pension fund property shall require for their adoption a majority vote of all the members of the Board.

RULE 19. No motion for a reconsideration of any vote shall be entertained unless such motion shall be made at the meeting at which the vote sought to be reconsidered shall have been taken, or at the next regular meeting thereafter.

Upon the request, indicated by a motion and second, or otherwise, of any two members of the Board who shall have voted with the prevailing side upon any matter, a motion made at the same meeting to reconsider the vote thereon, or a notice given at the same meeting of an intention to move at the next regular meeting a reconsideration of such vote shall, unless sooner disposed of, suspend the operation of the original vote until the close of the next regular meeting. Where the ayes and noes have not been called on any question, it shall be presumed, for the purpose of a motion to reconsider, that any member voted with the prevailing side upon such question.

RULE 20. Upon the request, indicated by motion and seconds, or otherwise, or any two members of the Board, the consideration of any report presented by any Committee shall be laid over for one meeting, and a copy of the report of the Committee be sent to each member.

RULE 21. No member shall speak longer than five minutes at any one time, nor more than once upon the same question, except by the consent of all the members of the Board; provided, that Chairman of Committees speaking on their reports may speak 10 minutes without such consent.

RULE 22. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Roberts' Rules of Order shall govern the Board in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the Board.

RULE 23. The records of the proceedings of the Board shall be carefully supervised by the President and the Secretary, who shall affix their signatures to such records, after they shall have been approved by the Board, and such records, when signed by the President and Secretary, shall be regarded as official.

RULE 24. Any teacher or employe having completed the required term of service and desiring to be placed upon the list of annuitants, shall make written application on the official blank adopted by the Board, and any teacher or employe having completed the required term of service and who has been involuntarily retired by action of the Board of Education of the City of Chicago and who has complied with the rules and regulations of this Board and with the pension law shall be placed on the list of annuitants on his or her application on the official blank adopted by the Board.

RULE 25. Any teacher or employe desiring the restoration of money paid into the retirement fund, because said teacher or employe has been discharged, or not re-employed, before the time when he or she would be entitled to an annuity,

shall make written application on the official blank adopted by the Board.

RULE 26. Until January, 1908, the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall withhold from the annuity of each and every woman annuitant a sum equal to 1 per cent of the salary received by said annuitant at the time of retirement; a similar percentage shall be withheld yearly from each and every man annuitant until January, 1911.

RULE 27. This Board reserves to itself the right to refuse an annuity to a teacher or employe who, after having served the requisite number of years, is discharged, or is not re-elected by the Board of Education.

RULE 28. The annual election of two Trustees by the teachers and employes shall take place the first Tuesday in November. On the first Saturday in October there shall be held in each of the several school districts, at the hour and in the places designated by the Board of Trustees, a meeting consisting of one delegate from each primary, grammar and high school within the given district. These delegates shall nominate two Trustees and forward to the Secretary of this Board the names of the nominees. The Secretary shall print Australian ballots containing the names of the nominees from the several districts. Voters shall be registered by the principals of the various schools two weeks before the election. Ballots cast shall be forwarded to the Secretary, who, with one delegate from each of the several nominating conventions, shall count them and report the results to this Board.

Mr. Sexton moved to amend by striking out the words "under Section 18, Rules and Regulations," printed on page 16, under Form of Application for Refunding.

It was so ordered.

Mr. Sexton moved to strike out Rule 2, printed on page 5, and insert instead the following: "The regular meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be held in the Board rooms of the Board of Education on the same dates as the first regular meeting of the Board of Education in the months of January, March, May, July, September and November."

Seconded by Mr. Rogers, and so ordered.

Mr. Sexton moved that the Rules and Regulations, as amended, be adopted.

Mr. Sexton moved that 10,000 copies of the Rules and Regulations be printed for distribution, and that the Secretary be instructed to insert the day of their adoption. It was so ordered.

STATEMENT OF THE PENSION FUND.

The Secretary presented the statement of the Auditor on the pension fund, as follows:

commends that the Secretary of the Teachers' and School Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund be authorized and directed to sell two 4 per cent City of Chicago water fund certificates, Nos. 2052 and 2053, dated December 1, 1898, due June 1, 1902, face value \$1,000, each belonging to the pension fund and in the custody of the City Treasurer, and further recommends that the City Treasurer be directed to deliver said two securities to the Secretary of the Pension Fund for the purpose of negotiating the sale, and that the proceeds thereof be deposited with the City Treasurer to meet the deficit of \$1,393.72.

OPINION OF ATTORNEY ON RESIGNATIONS.

CHICAGO, December 10, 1900.

Trustees of the Teachers' and Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund:

I am advised by the Secretary of the Board that, at the meeting of your committee held on November 14th, ult., you requested of

me an opinion as to whether or not J. W. Beckstrom, formerly a stenographer in the office of the Superintendent of Schools, is legally entitled to the amount which he contributed to the Pension Fund during his employment by the Board.

In reply thereto, I beg to say that the second section of paragraph eight of the Teachers' and employees' Pension and Retirement Fund Act is as follows: "If at any time a teacher or school employe who is willing to continue is not re-employed or is discharged before the time when he or she would, under the provisions of this act, be entitled to a pension, then such teacher or school employe shall be paid back at once all the money, with interest, he or she may have contributed under the law."

It will thus be seen that to entitle an ex-employe or teacher to the benefits of said section, there must have been a failure to re-employ such person, or that such person is discharged before the termination of his or her term of service.

Inasmuch as the records of the Board of Education show that the said J. W. Beckstrom formally resigned his employment while under trial upon charges preferred against him for misconduct in office, I am of the opinion that he is not entitled to take advantage of the provisions of said act.

The Board of Trustees, Teachers' and Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund:

There has been submitted to me for consideration and legal opinion, a communication from the sub-committee of fifteen, appointed by the authority of the Delegate Convention of the Teachers' and Employes' Pension and

Retirement Fund, praying for authority to employ an expert actuary and a lawyer of recognized learning and experience.

I have carefully examined the law under which said Pension Fund was created, and am of the opinion that the Board of Trustees have the implied authority to do whatever, in the exercise of a sound discretion, they may deem necessary for the safeguarding and preservation of the trust committed to their charge.

But I am further of the opinion that the appropriation of moneys for the purposes suggested can only be justified, under the Pension Law, when the Trustees are clearly satisfied that the preservation of the said trust requires such expenditures.

Report of Actuary.

The Secretary presented the report of Actuary J. H. Nitchie on the condition of the Pension Law.

F. J. Loesch, Esq., President School Pension Board, 304 Ashland Block, Chicago:

Dear Sir—I hand you herewith a report as to the law of 1895.

I have also prepared separately a report as to the proposed or amended bill of which I can furnish you a copy if desired, although I presume that it interests chiefly the committee of fifteen and is for their guidance in preparing the amendments. I presume, too, that the latter report will be somewhat extended in answer to inquiries from members of that committee.

Report as to Law of 1895.

This law provides for an assessment not exceeding 1 per cent per annum of the respective salaries; also for retirement of women after twenty years' service and of men after twenty-five years' service; also that the annuity upon retirement shall be one-half of the

final salary, in no case to exceed \$600.00 per annum.

I find that the contribution of 1 per cent is insufficient to provide such maximum annuity as the law prescribes. In reaching this conclusion I have considered cases submitted by the committee as fairly illustrating the individual conditions. I find that in no ordinary case would the contribution of 1 per cent during twenty-five years of service be sufficient to provide an annuity much, if at all, exceeding \$50.00 per annum. For a twenty years' term of contribution this amount would be considerably less, in some cases not one-half of the maximum amount just suggested.

For shorter terms of contribution the annuities earned would be less than proportionate to the maximum amounts earned by full-term contributions. For instance, 1 per cent on a salary of \$1,000.00 contributed during the last five years of a term of service would earn annuities not exceeding \$5.16 per annum, and, of course, smaller annuities for lesser contributions and lesser terms.

Yet the fund has been paying in just such cases pensions, ranging between \$400.00 and \$600.00. If such payments are to be continued to those now on the pension roll at the same rates as at present, which I understand amount in the aggregate to over \$50,000.00 per annum, there should be on hand a fund of over \$600,000.00, assuming that such fund could be safely invested at 4 per cent per annum during the life of the pensioners. But I understand that the total sum now in hand, even if it could be set apart exclusively for these pensioners, would cover barely one-sixth part of the present amount of the pension roll. This would leave contributors not yet pensioned to start anew and to provide for themselves such pensions only as their future contributions would earn, ignoring all contributions heretofore made to the present fund. These pensions, as appears from the estimates above referred to, could be but a small fraction of the maximum pensions prescribed by the law of 1895, unless the contributions could be supplemented by material appropriations from other sources, of which there seems to be no immediate prospect.

The provisions requiring equal contributions for equal pensions is inequitable between contributors of different conditions as to age, term of contribution, term of service, etc. The amount of the annuity or the rate of contribution, or both, should be varied with due regard to these conditions.

My attention has also been called to the bill which has been prepared to amend some of the provisions of the laws of 1895. In another report I consider this amended bill.

The report shows that the present fund is not only insufficient to meet the outstanding pensions, but even to provide for those now in service such pensions as their contributions have earned. As shown above, there is now on hand no sufficient fund to provide for present pensioners at the rates now being paid. In addition there should be on hand from contributions by those now in service and additions from interest, etc., a fund not less than \$200,000, at a moderate estimate, and exclusively for the benefit of those now in service. But the fund now available for both purposes is barely one-half of this amount.

This will also show the inequity under present conditions of refunding to those dismissed the amounts contributed by them with interest; such refund would be more than their share of the fund now in hand, that fund having been depleted, by payment of excessive pensions, to less than one-half the amount required for this purpose.

I would also suggest, as a measure of temporary relief, that all pensions be reduced for the present to a nominal amount, say \$5.00 or \$10.00 per annum; this would be a reduction in accordance with the provisions of the present law and would amount practically to a suspension of benefits until such time as it may seem best to increase the amounts.

Reinvest Balance on Hand to the Credit of Pension Fund.

A report of the committee that by the Auditor's statement of March 30, 1901, there was in the hands of the City

Treasurer to the credit of "The Public School Teachers' and Public School Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund" a balance of \$13,939.17.

And requesting authority to invest the above sum, together with any additional sum that may accrue, up to the date of investment, in City of Chicago bonds or mortgage securities.

No objections having been made to any of the recommendations contained in the several reports submitted, on motion of Mr. Mark the reports were received and the recommendations contained therein were adopted, such adoption being declared to have been the action of the Board on each individual recommendation.

THE AMENDED PENSION LAW.

The following is a copy of the amended pension law:

"A BILL

For an act amending Section 1 of an act entitled 'An act to provide for the formation and disbursement of a public school teachers' and public school employes' pension and retirement fund, in cities having a population exceeding 100,000 inhabitants,' approved May 31, 1895, in force July 1, 1895.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the People of the State of Illinois, represented in the General Assembly: That Section one of an act entitled 'An act to provide for the formation and disbursement of a public school teachers' and public school employes' pension and retirement fund, in cities having a population exceeding 100,000 inhabitants,' approved May 31, 1895, in force July 1, 1895, be amended so as to read as follows: That the Board of Education in cities having a population exceeding 100,000 inhabitants shall have power, and it shall be the duty of said Board to create a public school teachers' and public school employes' pension and retirement

fund, and for that purpose shall set apart the following moneys, to-wit:

1. An amount not exceeding 1 per cent per annum of the respective salaries paid to teachers and school employes elected by such Board of Education, which amount shall be deducted in equal installments from said salaries at the regular time for the payment of such salaries.

2. All moneys received from donations, legacies, gifts, bequests or otherwise, on account of said fund.

3. All moneys which may be derived from any and all sources: *Provided, however*, that no tax shall ever be levied for said fund.

4. *Any public school teacher or public school employe, a part of whose salary is now or may hereafter be set apart to provide for the fund herein created by this act, may be released from the necessities of making further payments to said fund by filing a written notice of his or her desire to withdraw from complying with the provisions of this act, with said board of trustees, which said resignation shall operate and go into effect immediately upon its receipt by said board of trustees.*

COMMUNICATION IN REFERENCE TO PENSIONERS REFERRED.

The following is the communication:

CHICAGO, June 12, 1901.

Graham H. Harris, *President Board of Education*:

DEAR SIR—At the last regular meeting of the

Engineers and Janitors' Association, the passing of the present pension law was discussed. The new law and its possible effects was also considered, with the result that a committee was appointed to bring the following suggestions before you and to request your kind co-operation in bringing about the following changes:

We desire, first of all, that the pensioners from our ranks be paid a pension sufficient for them to live upon.

To secure this, there must be no further reduction in their pensions, but, as the new law makes participation optional, we may expect a material defection among the teachers. Should this happen, it will be necessary either to reduce the pensions or to apply the reserve fund towards meeting the pension pay roll.

We suggest the following plan: That as the teachers, who compose about 90 per cent of the contributors, pay only \$7 00 a year on an average, that this sum be made the maximum required reduction for all, but that the engineers be still assessed the full 1 per cent on their salary, up to say \$24.00 a year, and that the difference be applied to supplement the pensions of their superannuated men.

The following committee would be pleased to wait upon you, or upon any committee you may see fit to name, and explain their ideas to them in detail.

ANNUITIES TO BE DECREASED.

Mr. Harris moved that the present rate of pensions be decreased and that the amount of the pension to be paid annuitants be referred to the Committee on Funds as to what rate shall be paid, with a request to report back to the Board.

Mr. Deegan presented the following as a substitute for the motion made by Mr. Harris:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Board of Education be instructed to reduce annuities in 10 per cent. steps, or in multiples thereof, as may be necessary to keep the monthly pay roll of pensioners within the receipts from the 1 per cent. deductions.

He shall notify the Board of Trustees of his action at their next meeting.

Mr. Mark stated that he thought the matter should have the consideration of the committee to determine the amount of annuities to be paid pensioners for the balance of the school year, and that the Board should accumulate and add something to the surplus in addition to paying annuities, and moved to amend the motion made by Mr. Harris, by providing that the matter be referred to the Committee on Funds with power to act, and that the Secretary be instructed to make the reductions ordered by said committee in order to come within the amounts contributed on the 1 per cent. basis, in future payment of annuities.

Mr. Harris accepted the amendment, and the motion, as amended, was adopted.

ADOPTION OF RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Mr. Deegan presented the following as the proposed amended rules of the Pension Board and moved that they be adopted as the rules of the Pension Board.

Seconded by Mr. Loesch and so ordered.

RULE 1. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a President, a Vice-President and a Secretary, who shall hold their respective offices for one year and until their successors shall

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be elected and qualified. These officers shall be elected at the regular meeting in the month of July of each year, or as soon thereafter as may be practicable; the election shall be by ballot, and a majority vote of the entire Board will be necessary to elect. The person elected Secretary need not be a member of the Board, but must be a member, or employed by the Board of Education of the City of Chicago. None of the above mentioned officers shall receive any remuneration or compensation.

RULE 2. The regular meetings of the Board of Trustees shall be held in the Board rooms of the Board of Education on the same dates as the first regular meeting of the Board of Education in the months of January, March, May, July, September and November.

RULE 3. The President of the Board, or any five members, may at any time call a special meeting of this Board, and all actions taken by this Board at a special meeting shall have the same force and effect as if the same were done at a regular meeting. Timely notice in writing shall be sent by the Secretary to all members of this Board of all meetings. Such notices may be sent by mail to the usual postoffice address of each member.

RULE 4. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Board at which he shall be present, and he shall perform such other duties as usually pertain to his office, or as may be enjoined upon him by the Board. He shall be, *ex officio*, a member of each General Standing Committee.

RULE 5. The Vice-President shall preside at meetings of the Board at which he is present and from which the President shall be absent, and he shall perform such other duties as may be enjoined upon him by the Board. In case of the absence or disability of the President, or of a vacancy in the office of the President, all the powers and duties of that office shall, temporarily, devolve on the Vice-President, who shall continue to exercise such powers and duties until they shall be resumed by the President, or until the vacancy shall be filled by the election of a President.

RULE 6. The Secretary shall have a general supervision of the books of record ordered kept by the Board. He shall have the monthly payroll of pensioners; the monthly receipts from payrolls, by departments; all applications for annuities, and the names and positions of those withdrawing from the Pension Fund—printed in the proceedings of this Board. He shall also perform such other duties as usually pertain to the office of Secretary or as may be enjoined upon him by the Board.

RULE 7. The Standing Committees of the Board shall be appointed by the President, as soon as practicable after his election, and there shall be six Standing Committees, as follows: Committee on Judiciary, five members; Committee on Funds, five members; Committee on Claims, five members; Committee on Annuities, five members; Committee on Pension Law, five members; Committee on Rules, five members. All Committees shall enter upon their duties immediately on their appointment.

RULE 8. The Committee on Judiciary shall exercise a general supervision over such affairs of the Board as involve legal questions, shall advise the Board from time to time concerning the Board's legal duties, obligations and relations.

RULE 9. The Committee on Funds shall exercise a general supervision over the finances and the property belonging to the Board of Trustees, and shall attend to the making of

reports, from time to time, of the condition of the funds of this Board, and shall attend to the investing of the funds of this Board in such manner as this Board, by a majority vote of all its members shall direct, and shall do and perform all things necessary to be done to save and keep the property of this Board in a strong financial and solvent condition.

RULE 10. The Committee on Claims shall hear, determine and pass upon all claims against this Board or against the property of the Board by any person, and report to the Board its findings, conclusions and recommendations.

RULE 11. The Committee on Annuities shall hear, determine and carefully consider all claims for annuities either on the application of any person, or when any person may be retired by the Board of Education of the City of Chicago, and as to the right of such person to annuity, and report its action to this Board. Said committee shall have power to consider and report reductions, from time to time, in the amount of all annuities.

RULE 12. The Committee on Pension Law shall at all times keep a careful watch on the operation of the law under which this Board exists, to note its weaknesses and defects, if any, and wherein such law should be amended, altered or changed, and to make full and complete records, if any be found, and suggesting any amendments, alterations or changes, if any be deemed necessary, and in such record the various reasons therefor shall be fully set forth, and report the same, from time to time, to the Board, and especially within a reasonable time before the meeting of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois.

RULE 13. The Committee on Rules shall consider the rules and regulations of this Board, and shall from time to time report to this Board such rules or amendments to these rules as it may deem necessary for the government of this Board or to carry out and execute the spirit and intent of the Pension Law.

RULE 14. Any Committee of the Board may, as it shall deem advisable, consider any matters coming within the general scope of its duties, and advise the Board concerning such matters without waiting to have them brought to its attention through reference from the Board.

RULE 15. At each meeting of the Board the President shall take the chair at the time appointed for the meeting, and call the meeting to order, and if a quorum be present, the order of business shall be as follows: I. Roll call. II. Reading and consideration of minutes. III. Petitions. IV. Communications. V. Orders and resolutions. VI. Unfinished business. VII. Reports of General Standing Committees in the following order: 1. Committee on Judiciary. 2. Committee on Funds. 3. Committee on Claims. 4. Committee on Annuities. 5. Committee on Pension Law. 6. Committee on Rules. VIII. Reports of Special Committees. IX. Miscellaneous business. X. Adjournment.

RULE 16. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, but a less number may adjourn a meeting to a subsequent date.

RULE 17. The ayes and noes shall be taken and entered of record on all questions on the paying out of money or the loaning of Pension Fund property, and on any other question at the request of any member, if such request be made before the result of the vote shall be announced. All questions on the paying out of money or the loaning of Pension Fund property shall require for their adop-

tion a majority vote of all the members of the Board.

RULE 18. No motion for a reconsideration of any vote shall be entertained unless such motion shall be made at the meeting at which the vote sought to be reconsidered shall have been taken, or at the next regular meeting thereafter. Upon the request, indicated by a motion and second, or otherwise, of any two members of the Board who shall have voted with the prevailing side upon any matter, a motion made at the same meeting to reconsider the vote thereon, or a notice given at the same meeting of an intention to move at the next regular meeting a reconsideration of such vote, shall, unless sooner disposed of, suspend the operation of the original vote until the close of the next regular meeting. Where the ayes and noes have not been called on any question, it shall be presumed, for the purpose of a motion to reconsider, that any member voted with the prevailing side upon such question.

RULE 19. Upon the request, indicated by motion and seconds, or otherwise, of any two members of the Board, the consideration of any report presented by any committee shall be laid over for one meeting, and a copy of the report of the committee be sent to each member.

RULE 20. The rules of the Board, or any of them, at any meeting, may be altered or amended, or their operation may be suspended for the time being by a majority vote of all the members of the Board; *provided*, however, that such alterations, amendments or suspensions shall not conflict with any provision of the constitution or laws of the state.

RULE 21. No member shall speak longer than five minutes at any one time, nor more than once upon the same question, except by the consent of all the members of the Board; *provided*, that Chairmen of Committees speaking on their reports may speak ten minutes without such consent.

RULE 22. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the Board in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the Board.

BY-LAWS.

BY-LAW 1. The records of the proceedings of the Board shall be carefully supervised by the President and the Secretary, who shall affix their signatures to such records, after they shall have been approved by the Board, and such records, when signed by the President and Secretary, shall be regarded as official.

BY-LAW 2. Any teacher or employe who is still contributing to the fund and having completed the required term of service and desiring to be placed on the list of annuitants, shall make written application on the official blank adopted by the Board, and any teacher or employe having completed the required term of service and who has been involuntarily retired by action of the Board of Education of the City of Chicago, and who was a contributor at the time of involuntary retirement, shall be placed on the list of annuitants on his or her application on the official blank adopted by the Board.

BY-LAW 3. Any teacher or employe desiring the restoration of money paid into the Retirement Fund, because said teacher or employe has been discharged, or not re-employed, before the time when he or she would be entitled to an annuity, shall make written application on the official blank adopted by the Board.

BY-LAW 4. Any teacher or employe desiring to withdraw from the Pension Fund shall make written application on the official blank adopted by the Board of Trustees. No person so withdrawing shall be allowed to again become a participant in the Pension Fund.

BY-LAW 5. It shall be the duty of the Auditor of the Board of Education to keep a separate account of all moneys that have been, or that shall be contributed by the employes from the moneys contributed by the teachers, and such moneys contributed by the employes shall be used only for the payment of pensions or refunds to said employes and their expenses; the employes shall not be entitled to any benefits from the teacher's contributions.

BY-LAW 6. The annual election of two trustees shall take place on the first Wednesday in June. On the second Saturday in May there shall be held in each of the several school districts, at the hour and in the school designated by the Board of Trustees, a meeting consisting of one delegate from each elementary and high school within the given district. These delegates shall nominate two Trustees and forward to the Secretary of the Board the names of the nominees. The employes shall hold their meeting on the same date at the Board rooms. Two weeks before election the Secretary shall mail a registration sheet to each School, upon which all contributors in the School shall register their names and addresses. This registration sheet shall be returned by the principal to the secretary at once. The Secretary shall have printed Australian ballots on numbered, return postal cards, these cards to contain the names of the nominees from the several conventions. The blank ballot shall be mailed by the Secretary on the day preceeding election to each contributor registered. Each voter after signifying his choice shall immediately mail the ballot to the Secretary, who, with one delegate from each of the nominating conventions, shall count them the following Saturday and report the results to this body. A special election shall be called whenever there is vacancy. The employes shall be entitled to a representative on the Board, but he shall have no vote unless regularly elected thereto.

BY-LAW 7. These by-laws may be amended by submitting the desired changes in writing at a regular meeting of the Board; they shall then lay over until the following meeting, when, if adopted by a majority vote of the members of the Board, they shall go into effect at once. All former by-laws not contained herein are hereby repealed.

REPORT OF REDUCTION OF ANNUITIES.

Mr. Mark, Chairman of the Committee on Funds, presented reports of the committee as follows:

To the Pension Board:

Your Committee on Funds, to whom was referred at the last meeting of the Board the question of reducing annuities sufficiently to keep within the income of the pension fund, recommends that, beginning with September, 1901, all annuities to be paid to persons who have been retired on the pension list by this Board be reduced to 60 per cent, based on the amount of annuity on which they were originally retired.

Miss Root moved to amend the report by changing the word "persons" to "teachers." Seconded by Mr. Deegan.

Mr. Mark made a point of order that under the law the Board could not make one rule for teachers and one rule for engineers, employes, etc., but that one rule must cover both cases.

The Chair held that the point of order was well taken.

Mr. Mark moved that the report of the committee be adopted.

Seconded by Mr. Vopicka.

Mr. Deegan moved as an amendment that the report, be laid upon the table.

Mr. Harris moved that that portion of the report to pay engineers, janitors, etc., be laid over for two weeks, and that the teachers be paid in accordance with the foregoing report.

There being no second to the motions made by Mr. Deegan and Mr. Harris, the Chair held that the question before the house was on the adoption of the motion made by Mr. Mark to adopt the report.

The roll being called, the motion was adopted; Yeas—Messrs. Cameron, Mark, Gallagher, Downey, Meier, Claussenius, Rowland, Vopicka, Hartung, Harris, Cooley, Deegan and Root—13. Nays—0.

Mr. Deegan moved that the legal matter as to whether the engineers, janitors, etc., could be paid on a different basis from the teachers be referred to the Committee on Judiciary to report at the next meeting.

Mr. Mark moved to amend the motion by providing that the committee also consider and report "not only the point of the different rate to be paid annuitants, but also the question of the division of the fund under the State Law."

It was so ordered.

On motion of Mr. Cameron the Board adjourned.

FIX TIME AT WHICH ANNUITIES SHALL TAKE EFFECT.

WHEREAS, He has not complied with this requirement up to the present time; therefore be it

Resolved, That we do now fix the amount of his bond at the sum of \$200,000 (two hundred thousand dollars) and that we notify him of it and make formal demand upon him to submit his bond to this body for its approval."

Mr. Harris moved to amend the resolution by providing that the amount of the bond shall be fixed at the amount deemed available by the the Committee on Finance.

DEAR SIR—When I withdrew from the Pension Fund contract last September it was because at that time no rule had been adopted to prevent the steady depletion and final exhaustion of the fund provided.

CHICAGO, May 12th, 1902.

To the Board of Trustees of the Public School Teachers' and Public School Employees' Pension and Retirement Fund, Hon. John T. Keating, President.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN—By-law six, page 14 of the new rules of the Pension Board requires among other things the following: "The blank ballots shall be mailed by the Secretary on the day preceding election to each contributor registered."

This rule, as it stands, virtually disfranchises many contributors to the fund as no allowance is made for postal delays—which do occur—and no time is given to correct errors, such as cards mis-sent, etc. Many teachers leave home before the first mail delivery, and, being absent all day, would not receive their ballots until late Wednesday, after the election had closed.

The Pension Committee of Seven at a meeting held on May 12, 1902, passed the following motion: Resolved, That the Pension Board of Trustees be requested to amend the aforesaid by-law by striking out the word "day" and inserting "Saturday" so that it may read: "The blank ballots shall be mailed by the Secretary on the Saturday preceding election to each registered contributor to the fund."

A committee, consisting of Miss A. T. McGinley, Miss Elizabeth K. Burdick, and Mrs. Margaret J. Codd, was appointed to present this request to your honorable body.

COMMUNICATION FROM CARL MENCKE REQUESTING REFUNDS.

The Secretary presented the following communications from Carl Mencke and Adelheid Mencke:

CHICAGO, June 16, 1902.

To the Secretary of Board of Trustees, Public School Teachers' and Public School Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund, City of Chicago.

DEAR SIR:—Following directions of by-law 3 of Rules and Regulations of the P. S. T. and E. Pension and Retirement Fund (September 25, 1901), I enclosed send you my request of restoration of money paid into said fund.

By order of Mr. Cooley, September, 1901, I was removed—contrary to the provisions of Section 312 of this pension fund law—from my position as teacher of the Hyde Park High School, without cause upon written charges and even without a trial.

As the meaning of this illegal and causeless removal was nothing but a year's notice for dismissal from the Chicago school system, I could have no benefit from the act of further contributing to the pension fund.

I sent an application to the Trustees of the pension fund to be relieved from other payments.

According to Section 1, 4, the resignation applied for should go into effect immediately upon its receipt by the pension board.

Contrary to these plain words of the law, my resignation was not accepted. I had to make another payment and I was granted the permission to stop further contributions only under the condition that I sign the form of application for withdrawal, given on page 18 of the above-mentioned rules, etc. This was neither a voluntary act nor did I understand it to mean that my waiving of claims and rights against the pension fund covered my rights and claims to the contributions made by me.

As I am sailing for Europe June 28, and do not come back to this country, I should like to have this affair settled immediately, as the law clearly says: "That these contributions shall be paid back at once."

I should consider it a favor to be officially notified before June 26 when my contributions are paid back to me.

If this cannot be done I am advised by my lawyer to turn my claim over to him, that he might begin legal proceedings against the pension fund.

FUNDS.

Mr. Wolff, Chairman of the Committee on Funds, presented reports of the Committee, as follows:

Report on Investment Made on Account of Teachers' and School Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund.

The Committee on Funds reports that, in accordance with authority granted at the meeting held December 10, 1902 (p. 249), it has drawn for investment on account of the Teachers' and School Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund to L. E. McGann, City Comptroller, Warrant No. 7173, in the sum of \$28,800, for City of Chicago Time Warrants Nos. 326 and 327, in the sums of \$20,000 and \$8,800, respectively, which have been deposited with the City Treasurer, as per receipt on file in the office of the Secretary, and recommends concurrence in its action.

JUDICIARY.

Mr. Harris, Chairman of the Committee on Judiciary, presented the following report:

The Committee on Judiciary to whom was referred at the meeting of the Pension Board held March 18, 1903, the attached report from the Committee on Annuities, respectfully reports that they have had the same under consideration, and have received the attached opinion from the Attorney relative thereto, and recommends that the original report from the Committee on Annuities, hereto attached, be adopted.

DEAR SIR:—In the matter of the application of Elrena R. Doty to be placed on the pension list, I have carefully considered your communications, together with the several actions of the Board of Education referred to therein.

The provision of the statute controlling the amount of the pension to be received by a teacher or school employe who has retired or has been retired, is as follows: "Section 4 (of the Pension Law). Each teacher and school employe so retired or

retiring shall thereafter be entitled to receive as an annuity one-half of the annual salary paid to said teacher or employe at the date of such retirement, said annuity to be paid monthly during the school year:

* * * * *

By the several actions of the Board of Education, Miss Doty's salary was to be at the rate of a given sum per year, with the exception of the action taken April 23, 1901, increasing her salary from twelve hundred to thirteen hundred dollars, where nothing was said as to the time which she would be required to devote to her work, but, as you state, and as the records of the Board show, she continued to work three-fifths time and to draw salary accordingly.

It would appear from the statutory provision above quoted, that the actual salary paid determines the amount of pension, and not the annual salary which a given position carries.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that Miss Doty's pension must be based upon the salary which she was actually paid at the time of her retirement, which, according to the records of the Board of Education, appears to have been \$780.00.

The Secretary stated that the estimated expenditures for the month of September will be \$3,566.00, and that the receipts for June were \$3,538.87, which will leave a shortage for the September expenses.

Mr. Mark moved that the statement be referred to the Committee on Funds, and it was so ordered.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE ATTORNEY.

The Secretary presented the following communications from the Attorney of the Board.

November 14, 1903.

Mr. Lewis E. Larson, Secretary, Board of Education.

DEAR SIR: Your communication under date of November 12, 1903, at hand, in which you ask my opinion as to the right of the Pension Board to grant an annuity to Mrs. Frances C. Temple, dating from the time of her resignation, two years ago.

Section 2 of the Pension Act empowers the Board of Trustees to make and estab-

lish such rules and regulations for the administration of said fund as they shall deem best.

Section 4 of the Pension Act provides that each teacher and school employe so retired or retiring shall thereafter be entitled to receive, as an annuity, one-half of the annual salary paid to said teacher or employe at the date of such retirement, etc.

By-law 2 of the Board of Trustees of the Pension and Retirement Fund provides, "Any teacher or employe who is still contributing to the fund and having completed the required term of service, and desiring to be placed on the list of annuitants, shall make written application on the official blank adopted by the Board, and any teacher or employe having completed the required term of service and who has been involuntarily retired by action of the Board of Education of the City of Chicago, and who was a contributor at the time of such involuntary retirement, shall be placed on the list of annuitants on his or her application on the official blanks adopted by the Board."

I am of the opinion that Section 4 of the Pension Act determines simply the amount of the annuity and not the date at which such annuity shall commence. Section 2 of the Pension Act empowers the Board to make such rules and regulations for the control of the fund as they shall deem best. The Board has seen fit, by the adoption of By-law 2, to determine the steps to be taken by a teacher or employe for the purpose of receiving an annuity, and requires such teacher or employe to make written application to be placed on the list of annuitants, and provides that such teacher or employe shall be placed on the list of annuitants on his or her application on the official blanks adopted by the Board.

Construing the sections of the Pension Act with this by-law, I am of the opinion that the annuity can be dated only from the time of the application by the teacher or employe.

DEAR SIR: Your communication under date of December 8, 1903, received, in which you state that you have received my opinion in the matter of dating teachers' pensions back. You also state that there are several instances in the past where pensions have been dated back for several months and, in some cases, a year, and you say that Dr. Stolz, President of the Teachers' Pension Fund, has directed you to ask me whether my former opinion would mean that such dating back in the past is illegal, and, if so, whether the Pension Board can demand the return of moneys paid as back pensions.

Replying to this communication, let me state again that under Section 2 of the Pension Act, the Board of Trustees are, among other things, given the following power:

"And shall have the power to make payments from said fund of annuities granted in pursuance of this act, and shall, from time to time, make and establish such rules and regulations for the administration of said fund as they shall deem best."

Section 4 of the Pension Act is as follows:

"Each teacher and school employe so retired or retiring shall thereafter be entitled to receive, as an annuity, one-half of the annual salary paid to said teacher or employe at the date of such retirement, said annuity to be paid monthly during the school year, etc."

It will be noted that this Section provides that the teacher or school employe so retired or retiring shall thereafter be entitled to receive. It does not state that the school teacher or employe so retired or retiring shall be paid. I take it there is a difference in being entitled to receive and a mandatory direction to pay.

Under Section 2 of the Pension Act, the Board of Trustees was empowered to make such rules as it saw fit. The Board did adopt rules and by-laws, and By-law 2 provides the manner in which the teacher or employe shall become entitled to pension, namely, by making written application on the official blanks adopted by the Board. It would not have been unlawful for the Board to have adopted a by-law providing for the pension to commence from the date of retirement, but this the Board did not do. Payment of back pensions was not contrary to the Pension Act itself, but was contrary to the by-laws adopted by the Board of Trustees. Inasmuch as the Board paid back pensions at different times, it simply violated its own by-law and not any provision of the Pension Act itself.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that whilst the payment of back pensions was contrary to the by-law so adopted, still, as the Board directed such pensions to be paid, it would be unwise to attempt to collect back the money so paid, if, indeed, it could be collected at all. In the future, however, the Board should follow strictly the Pension Act and its by-laws, and pay pensions only from date of application.

NO REDUCTION TO BE MADE IN ANNUITIES.

Your Committee on Funds, to whom was referred at the meeting held March 16, 1904, a communication from the Teachers' Club, suggesting that annuities be paid from assessments on teachers' salaries only, not from sinking fund or from interest thereon, after careful investigation of the matter, beg leave to report that they find that the use of such interest is sanctioned by the by-laws, and in view of the fact that the passage of a new law by the next Legislature is contemplated by those interested, recommend that there be no reduction in annuities until such time as the mainten-

ance of the present rate of annuities may become incompatible with available income.

DEAR DR. STOLZ—I have the honor to submit the following report with reference to the receipts and expenditures of the Public School Teachers and Public School Employes' Pension and Retirement Fund at the present time, together with a brief review of its financial condition for the past two years:

The receipts from pay rolls per month at present average about \$3,500.00, and the annuities aggregate about \$4,000.00, showing a deficit of about \$500.00 per month. If the Board of Trustees concludes to use the balance on hand, together with the interest to be collected during the present fiscal year, I am of the opinion that no decrease in the present pension rate will be necessary.

If, however, the Board should decide to invest the present cash balance in the reserve fund and use the income from the teachers' rolls only for payment of annuities, it will be necessary to cut the annuities fifteen per cent in order to make the receipts from the pay rolls cover the amount of annuities. By making a cut of twenty per cent there would be a margin of \$200.00

per month, which would provide for current expenses and additions to the list of annuitants. I am not sure that a cut of even twenty per cent will carry us through the year.
